- Roles or responsibilities that we have as individuals, communities and as a nation more broadly.





### **Reflections on the Forums**




- It was very interesting to read and learn from other students' perspectives/posts on the three dialogues.

According to the UNHCR, in 2015 34000 people displaced per day 24 people every minute (UNHCR)

### Our Reflection on the Crisis

- Among the millions of refugees in the world, less than 1% are resettled
- Even those that are resettled do not represent the most vulnerable or the needy of the needy mainly due to criteria of host countries
- The refugee crisis did not happen overnight and is a result of inextricably connected issues; therefore while resettlement is one durable solution for the very few, we need to focus on long term solutions for the majority that are displaced and for the new refugees being created as we speak
- As social workers, we will be guided by human rights, social justice and sustainable pieces and values to find other long lasting solutions for the majority by considering the whole system and the whole problem within its context

- Refugee being created every minute

- Islamophobia

### Social Work Lens



- Policy development
- Ally/Advocate
- Educator
- Cultural humility (willingness to engage or ask questions when unsure)
- Engage in genuine dialogue (positionality)
- Strength approach (resiliency)
- Trauma Informed Practice
- Social Justice
- Recognition that refugees may not want to fully integrate into Canadian culture

- CASW Code of Ethics
- Value of the Narrative- an intercultural approach
- Advocate for the creation of multidisciplinary teams and work towards finding a collective solution
- Recognition of intersectionality

- Community building and strengthening (making connections)

- Creation of safe spaces (including online like social media)
- Being aware and critical of our own actions and inactions (critical thinking skills)
- Being open minded
