






Daniel Beltranena Originally Created for History 212: Britain 1689-1914 with Dr. Aidan Forth


### SPANISH INFLUENZA.

#### NEW EPIDEMIC THAT CLAIMS MANY VICTIMS.

An epidemic of influenza is reported from various parts of the British Isles, but though many thousands of cases have occurred in both civilian and military hospitals, reports to-day suggest that the malady is not of a serious type, and that the few deaths notified so far have been those of weak patients suffering from other complications.

## Defence of the Realm Act (1914)

- Gave British Government far reaching powers in a time of war, including(but not limited to)...
  - > The right to censor press
  - Making it illegal to discuss naval and military Manners
  - Arrest foreigners or conscientious objectors of war
  - To seize factories, farms, and land
  - > New regulations for making laws



THE HAGUE, JULY 3.

"Spanish influenza" is increasing in Germany to an alarming extent. Many large industries in Berlin are suffering from the illness of their employees. In two weeks the number of patients on the books of the Berlin local sickness insurance office has increased from 16,000 to 18,000. From 200 to 300 new patients are reported daily.




A worker disinfecting a city bus - a common response to stopping the spread of flu was sanitation




