

# Financial Aid for Young Adult Cancer Survivors Attending University in Alberta

### Abstract

This study identified scholarships available to young adult cancer survivors who are either starting post secondary or are continuing their education at a post secondary institution in Alberta. Websites for six universities in Alberta were explored along with the Kids with Cancer Society's site for potential resources. Results revealed seven cancer-survivor based scholarships as well as another eighteen potentially applicable scholarships based on disability, GPA, financial need, community involvement or a combination of these factors.

# Introduction


According to Castellano, Eiroa-Orosa, Perez-Campdepadros, Capdevila, Sanchez de Toledo, and Blasco-Blasco (2015) cancer is challenging in regard to financial difficulties, physical difficulties, as well as mental health including significant distress. Zebrack et al. (2014) also found that young adult survivors reported financial problems due to cancer, and that health insurance was inadequate. The diagnosis of cancer often involves missing work. Limited financial resources may be problematic for individuals who were planning to pursue post secondary education. If their resources are drained by taking time off from work, and through funding treatment, these individuals may not be able to afford postsecondary education. These young adults need assistance in navigating their career and educational trajectories (Yanez et al., 2013). This study seeks to identify financial aids in the form of scholarships, bursaries, and awards that might assist young adults in their educational pursuits post-cancer.

#### Methods

To locate financial aid a search was conducted using the key terms "cancer scholarships", "cancer bursaries" and "Canada." To locate university financial aid, a second search was conducted using the key terms "Universities in Alberta." Six Universities were located and reviewed extensively for relevant information regarding financial aid. Universities with limited information online were contacted via email. A content analysis on the existing information was conducted in order to determine eligibility criteria, availability of awards, and the value of awards. Inclusion criteria involved financial aid based on disabilities, and/or GPA or community involvement. Financial aid based solely on participation in recreational activities/groups was excluded from the analysis.
